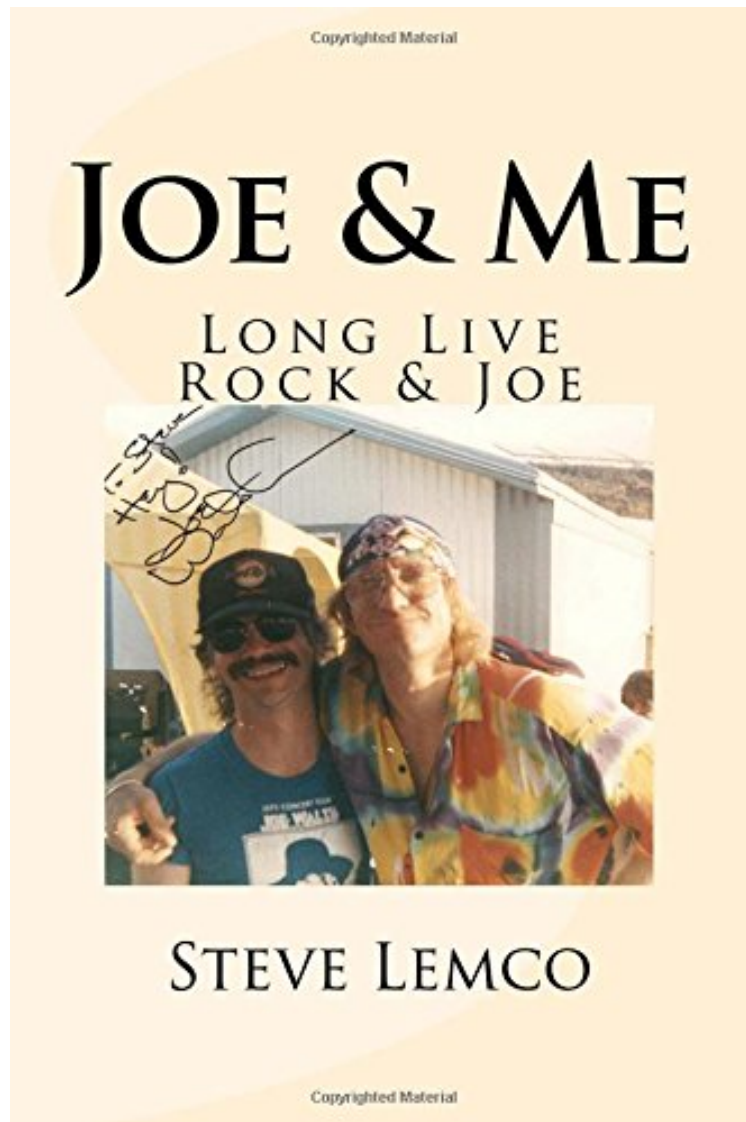

But it contained much more biographical information about the author, Steve Lemco. This was fine with me because as I read the book I found myself empathizing with the author as I read about both the joys, and the personal disappointments and tragedies in his life. Although I'm a huge admirer of Joe Walsh, as I read I found myself caring as much about Steve

Lemco and how his life turned out as I did about Joe. Filled with hilarious stories of Lemco's childhood, as well as his adult life and his quest to find out what his LSD premonition about Joe Walsh had to do with his life, I enjoyed this book. The only downside was that it could have been better proof read for a few grammatical errors and typos, but these never obscured the story. Overall, a good read. 4 of 5 people found the following review helpful. Where's Joe? By Customer I read about 40 novels/autobiographies/biographies each year. Reading is a great hobby for me. When I purchased this book I thought I was going to read about some sort of friendship between one of my all time guitar heroes, Joe Walsh, and the author. I was wrong in my perception. This book is all about the author's perceived premonition of what Joe Walsh has to do with the author's life (and I think the answer to that question is 'absolutely nothing'). As I started reading the first 20 or so pages I kept thinking 'where's Joe?' so I started flicking through pages looking for any mention of Joe Walsh. Joe Walsh gets a mention at around 39% (based on reading on a Kindle) and the author doesn't get to meet Joe until around halfway through the story (or 50%). After that the author gets to meet Joe Walsh 3 or 4 times based on the author trying to position himself at concerts, radio stations or hotel lobbies like a groupie would. I get the distinct impression that Joe Walsh was kind to the author but found him a bit of a pest. In the end the author stops meeting Joe having resolved his premonition by deciding he doesn't need Joe in his life anymore. So, what was the point of this book? I have no idea. I think the author wanted to write his life story and make a few sales by hooking in to a famous name. The best thing about reading this book was that after I got tired of reading and starting flicking through the pages I was done in less than 1 hour and I could move onto something a bit more entertaining. 1 of 1 people found the following review helpful. The 3rd brother would run away from home at age 16 and join a carnival. In 1977 he robbed a bank in Eugene Oregon. He received 40 years in prison.
